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US Hay Production Expected to Increase Again in 2024 By: Kenny Burdine, University of Kentucky

As I have done the last few years, I selected some state estimates from the USDA's August Crop Production report to provide some regional perspective on likely hay production levels. As can be seen in the table below, non-Alfalfa hay production is expected to be higher in most states. Texas and Missouri especially stand out, and it is worth noting that they are projected to be the two states with the highest production levels nationwide. Oklahoma stands out to the downside, but that decrease is driven by a sizeable drop in expected harvested acres. Hay production was projected higher in Kentucky, Arkansas, and Mississippi, with Tennessee (down 10.2%) being the outlier in the Southeast.

While a lot can still change with respect to hay production this fall, the August Crop Production report does paint a picture of incréased hay supplies in many areas. In addition to hay production, fall grazing prospects will also impact how much hay will be needed in the upcoming winter. It is also important to understand that these production estimates say nothing about hay quality, which is another important element of the discussion. I like to examine hay production estimates and do think it provides some general perspective, but I would also reiterate how different hay availability can be across the country. It's never too early to think about winter hay needs and make plans to source additional hay, if needed.

Garden Calendar <u>SEPTEMBER</u>

Get Ready

- Order or purchase Spring bulbs locally for October planting.
- Build or buy a compost bin in anticipation of autumn leaves.

Plant

- Plant cool-season leafy root vegetables: Beets, Carrots, Lettuce, Spinach, & Turnips.
- Sow hardy annuals: Sweet Alyssum, Calendula, Annual Pinks, Snapdragon, & Sweet Peas.
- Sow rye grass seed in winter lawns.

Fertilize

- Stop feeding mums when the buds start showing color.
- Acidify Azaleas & Camelias.

Water

- Slow down watering of Azaleas & Hydrangeas to allow them to harden against winter freezes.
- Spray the foliage of Camelias in anticipation of their bloom.
- Water potted plants & hanging baskets frequently.

Miscellaneous

- Turn compost pile.
- Pick flowers in bloom and dry for future arrangements. Bundle flowers together and hang them upside down in a dry, sheltered area.
- Repot houseplants. Prune away damaged foliage and give a good dose of plant food.





Plant

- Pot up Basil, Chives, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage, and Sweet Marjoram for that sunny kitchen window.
- Wisteria & Trumpet Vine can be planted this month.
- Annuals to plant are Pansies, Violas, Pinks, Flowering Cabbage & Kale, & English Daisy. Wildflower seeds to be planted are Cornflowers, Larkspur, & Queen Anne's Lace.
- Perennials to plant include Asters, Salvia, Hollyhock, Daylilies, Babies' Breath, Iris, Shasta Daisy, Peonies, & Phlox.

Fertilize

- Test the soil in the garden to monitor the balance of minerals.
- Soil testing boxes are available at the Lee County Extension Office.

Prune

- Remove damaged and dead wood from trees and shrubs.
- Prune back annuals like Blue Salvia & Dianthus to the ground & mulch. They may go through the winter and bloom again.

Miscellaneous

- Dig up Caladiums now with foliage intact and allow to dry. Remove dried foliage & store in peat moss in a cool, dark place for replanting next year.
- Force bulbs for indoor show. Place the bulb on gravel and water enough to cover the roots. Keep in a dark place until the root system is established and the sprout reaches three inches. Bring gradually into the light and refill the container with water to its original level. Enjoy the blooms of Paper-white, Narcissus, Jonquil, or Hyacinth indoors.
- Make sure the birds in your garden have food, shelter, and water or nectar.
- Place leaves in compost bin.




