

A Program for Mississippi Citizens and Communities

Cince 1998, the Rural Medical and Science Scholars program has been focused on helping high school seniors determine if they want to pursue health-related careers and shaping students' interest and understanding of medicine, health-related disciplines, and other STEM fields. The scholars engage with healthcare professionals, complete 1 month of health science college coursework and engage in didactic, observational, and experiential learning. Discovering interest and solidifying career intent early, whether healthcare-related or not, can strengthen future goals, save money, and help ensure a successful career path.

Adding one physician to a community contributes an average of \$1.8 million in additional economic output. Hence, the program works to ensure a strong and passionate workforce for the long-term goals of improving Mississippi's economy and increasing access to healthcare.
