# Fall Armyworm Activity Continues Across Mississippi: Surveillance UPdate September 4, 2025

Fall armyworm activity continues to impact forage producers across the state, according to the latest data from the Mississippi Armyworm Surveillance Program. As of this update, reports have come in from multiple counties and zip codes, with varying levels of infestation and forage damage.

#### **Armyworm Populations: Mostly Moderate**

Survey responses indicate that the majority of fall armyworm sightings are at moderate levels (64%), meaning 4 to 7 caterpillars per square foot. About 28% of reports classified infestations as low, and 9% reported heavy infestations with more than 8 caterpillars per square foot.

#### Forage Damage Widespread but Mostly Slight

When it comes to forage damage:

- 59% of reports described the damage as slight
- 34% noted moderate damage
- 7% experienced severe damage

Armyworm-related damage has been reported on a total of 4,867 acres:

- 2,627 acres of hayfields
- 2,240 acres of pasture

Producers should remain vigilant, especially during late summer and early fall when conditions remain favorable for armyworm development. Timely scouting and early intervention can help reduce potential forage losses.

#### **Report Armyworm Activity**

#### Fall Weed Control Begins Soon

Control of Winter annual weeds begins towards the end of summer and beginning of fall. Pre-emergence herbicides should be applied in late-August early September to prevent these annual winter weeds from becoming an issue. To be effective, preemergence herbicides must be applied before weeds emerge. To be effective, they must be applied before weed seed germination. These herbicides require 0.25 to 0.5 inches of rainfall or irrigation for activation so try to time the application within a day or two or expected rainfall, but not a torrential downpour where all of the product ends up being washed away. All of the herbicides in this list can be used on established, southern turfgrasses. In some instances it may be beneficial to apply ½ the recommended rate and then reapply the remainder of the rate 4-6 weeks later to provide better control. However, READ and FOLLOW THE LABEL completely to make sure you can use it in your situation.

A partial list of common (active ingredient) and trade names for pre-emergent weed control in home lawns by homeowners can be found below. Just as with an application of fertilizer, going in two different directions that total the labeled rate will provide a more consistent barrier to emerging weeds rather than an application in one single direction. Depending upon label directions and application restrictions for the particular product you purchase, reapplication may be beneficial in 6-8 weeks. It is not recommended you use a product that contains a fertilizer carrier at this time as the turf is getting prepared for winter dormancy and encouraging a flush of growth this late can be detrimental in many cases. A more complete chart, and the efficacy towards particular weeds, can be found within Publication 1322 – Establish and Manage Your Home Lawn.

#### fall Garden Tips

Fall may bring cooler weather to mind, but hot, dry days are still ahead—and your garden still needs attention! With the right care, this can be a productive time of year. Here are a few tips to help your garden thrive this season:

#### **Water Wisely**

Late summer and early fall can be deceptively dry. While plants may look fine, they're often stressed. If your fall garden is growing strong, a little water and fertilizer now can lead to big yields. Plants are gearing up to set fruit as temperatures drop, and consistent watering will support production right up to the first frost.

#### **Collect Seeds**

If you love starting plants from seed like I do, now is the perfect time to collect your own. It's cost-effective, gives you access to more varieties, and helps preserve your favorites. Be sure to collect from fully ripe, disease-free fruits and flowers. Dry seeds well before storing and remember: heirlooms will grow true next year, while hybrids may not.

#### **Plan Ahead**

With the season winding down, take stock of your tools, containers, and supplies. Now's a great time to repair, replace, or grab end-of-season deals. Most importantly, get a soil test! Fall testing gives you time to make soil adjustments (like adding lime, phosphorus, or potassium) before spring. Just skip the nitrogen until planting time.

Below is a snapshot of part of my garden and its watchful guardian, Weezy. I included it to fill some space, but also because I'm happy with how it's turned out over the last few years. I love peppers, container gardening (even if the pots don't match), and packing in more plants than I probably should.


