### MCES TIMBER PRICE REPORT

# 1. WHAT IS THIS REPORT?


The MCES Timber Price Report is a monthly survey of stumpage and delivered timber prices in Mississippi. It is developed through the cooperation of public and private members of the forestry sector with MCES to provide an accurate picture of timber market activity. Mississippi is divided into four market regions that reflect distinct timber markets within the state (see map) and average prices for common forest products are listed. These values are compiled by polling cooperators from forest industry, public agencies, consulting foresters and landowners.

# 2. HOW TO USE THIS REPORT.

This report is intended to give a profile of timber prices in Mississippi.

Values given are offered as a guide to help individuals assess the fair-market value of their timber. The average price for a region should NOT be applied as the exact value for a particular timber tract. The best way for private landowners to obtain the highest price for a particular tract is to use competitive bidding. These prices, however, do reflect current timber market activity in each region.

Certain factors may cause a particular tract of timber to be valued higher or lower. For example, a tract that has a high timber volume per acre and can be logged during wet weather may bring a price per unit higher than the average reported here. On the other hand, a tract with less volume at great distance from the buyer's mill may bring less. Additional factors that affect timber values are timber quality, tract size, type of product to be made from the timber, access to the tract and many These values are a good price reference for landowners who wish to market timber, but individuals are advised to have their timber evaluated by a professional forester before making a timber sale.



## TIMBER MARKET COMMENTS

# Sawtimber

This winter has been difficult for many mills with most hardwood mills in particular being down from 1 to 2 days to 2 to 3 weeks because of a shortage of logs. Sawlog inventories at most of the mills contacted was reported to be improving, but several mills still had "medium to low" inventories.

Several mills in the north and central part of the state reported that Southern Pine beetles were getting active again. One reporter said "I don't think they ever stopped."

Many mills, both hardwood an pine, again report that business is "good" and production slowdowns came at an unfortunate time. Oak remains strong and still drives the hardwood market. Although supplies are relatively low, ash has held strong in the market. Pine lumber demand remains "good" after experiencing increases due to the Canadian lumber settlement at the first of the year. Several reporters indicated that "if the weather will clear, operations will be o.k."

In the southern reporting district pine log prices again tended to be lower in the wester section and higher in the east. During February, the average pine sawtimber delivered price for southwest Mississippi was \$202. The average price for the southeast was \$246.

In the central reporting district, cooperators reported stumpage prices for good quality Tupelo gum and sweet gum at \$70/MBF and yellow poplar at \$90/MBF. Delivered prices for ash logs averaged \$160/MBF.

In the Delta delivered priced for ash ranged from \$220-\$238/MBF, averaging \$231/MBF.


## Pulpwood


Most pulpwood yards reported earlier that rainy weather had increased the demand and they were buying all they could get at slightly higher prices. Hardwood pulpwood still is in demand with prices still good for delivered hardwood. Several yards reported that orders for pine pulpwood had begun to slow.


## Other Comments



The MCES price report was not published in February (Jan.-Feb. prices) due to publishing difficulties and scarcity of data for some products due to reporting mills being shut down because of poor logging conditions.
