HORSE EDUCATIONAL CONTESTS

There will be one junior and one senior overall
educational contest high point buckle to be awarded
from a compilation of points earned only from the
highest three contest placings of the following
contests: hippology; horse judging; horse bowl;
horse public speaking; horse individual
demonstration; and horse team demonstration.

HORSE EDUCATIONAL CONTESTS

 Top 10 individual points will be earned from each of these contests. In a contest with more than 10 participants, the high point individual will get 10 points down to the 10th place person getting 1 point.

HORSE EDUCATIONAL CONTESTS

 In the event of a tie, the high point award will go to the individual who beat the greatest number of contestants in the contests from which the three highest contest placings were generated. Points for educational contests will not be combined with points from the horse show.

JUNIOR & SENIOR 4-H HORSE EDUCATION CONTESTS

 Entries are inserted in an Excel spreadsheet that is sent to Dean to register junior and senior 4-H'ers for all contests.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

• 1. Speeches and presentations should be original and constructed and delivered by 4-H'ers. Any form of plagiarism is strictly prohibited. Plagiarism can include, but is not limited to: copying parts of a speech or presentation previously presented by another youth or individual; using text, phrases, photos, or diagrams from an article, video, book, movie, or other published work without giving credit to the author. Competitor's resource citation should be specific, accurate, and honest. If contest officials confirm plagiarism, the contestant will automatically be placed last, with a notation on the scorecard to reflect such infraction.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

 2. The presentation may be a demonstration or illustrated talk. All references to the term "presentation" in these rules include either demonstration or illustrated talk. A demonstration is defined as a presentation of a step-by-step procedure with an end product or result. An illustrated talk is defined as a presentation of an idea or topic that uses visual aids to convey the message.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

 Both presentation forms are acceptable and will be evaluated equally, although the delivery methods are different as defined above. Both should utilize visual aids to help convey the major points of the presentation, and more than one type of visual aid is preferable. Visual aids may include, but are not limed to: handouts, poster, props, videos, slides, and computer-generated media. No live animals may be used.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

8. Senior presentations should be 9-12 minutes in length. Three points will be deducted from the total score on each judge's score sheet for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under 9 minutes or over 12 minutes. After the individual has been introduced by the superintendent, the time will start once the contestant begins to speak.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

 9. Junior presentations should be 5-10 minutes in length. Three points will be deducted from the total score on each judge's score sheet for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under 5 minutes or over 10 minutes. After the individual has been introduced by the superintendent, the time will start once the contestant begins to speak.

HORSE INDIVIDUAL & TEAM DEMONSTRATIONS (PG. 66-67)

- Organization
 - 4. Could the audience see each step and/or visual aid?
- Stage Presence
 - 1. Were the presenters neat and appropriately dressed for the subject of the presentation?
 - 2. Did the presenter speak directly to and look at the audience?
 - 3. Was the presentation too fast or too slow?
- Delivery
 - 6. Did the presenters work together as a team?

HORSE PUBLIC SPEAKING (PG. 67-68)

• 1. Speeches and presentations should be original and constructed and delivered by 4-H'ers. Any form of plagiarism is strictly prohibited. Plagiarism can include, but is not limited to: copying parts of a speech or presentation previously presented by another youth or individual; using text, phrases, photos, or diagrams from an article, video, book, movie, or other published work without giving credit to the author. Competitor's resource citation should be specific, accurate, and honest. If contest officials confirm plagiarism, the contestant will automatically be placed last, with a notation on the scorecard to reflect such infraction.

HORSE PUBLIC SPEAKING (PG. 67-68)

2. No coaching from parents or coaches during the speech.
 Once the individual has started their speech, they may not receive assistance from any coach, parent, audience member, or other person. The penalty for violating this rule is disqualification. The subject matter must pertain to the horse industry. Speeches not appropriately related to the horse industry can be disqualified at the discretion of the judge(s).

HORSE PUBLIC SPEAKING (PG. 67-68)

7. Senior speeches should be 7-10 minutes in length.
 Three points will be deducted from the total score on each judge's score sheet for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under 7 minutes or over 10 minutes.
 After the individual has been introduced by the superintendent, the time will start once the contestant begins to speak.

HORSE PUBLIC SPEAKING (PG. 67-68)

8. Junior speeches should be 3-5 minutes in length.
 Three points will be deducted from the total score on each judge's score sheet for every minute (or fraction of a minute) under 3 minutes or over 5 minutes.
 After the individual has been introduced by the superintendent, the time will start once the contestant begins to speak.

HORSE PUBLIC SPEAKING (PG. 67-68)

- Stage Presence
 - 1. Was the speaker neat and appropriately dressed?
 - 2. Did the speaker talk directly to and look at the audience?
 - 3. Was the speaker's posture erect but not stiff?
 - 4. Did the speaker seem relaxed and at ease?
- Delivery
 - Removed criteria #3 from the 2018 book

HORSE JUDGING (PG. 68-69) TEAMS MUST CONSIST OF 3 OR 4 MEMBERS

- Junior and Senior entry deadline: Friday, May 31 to ADS Office
 - No Junior Contest at District Show
- Juniors will judge four halter classes and four performance classes and give oral reasons on one halter class and one performance class
- Seniors will judge four halter classes and four performance classes and give oral reasons on two halter classes and two performance classes

HIPPOLOGY CONTEST (PG. 69-70); TEAMS MUST CONSIST OF 3 OR 4 MEMBERS

- Junior and Senior entry deadline: Friday, May 31 to ADS Office
 - No Junior Contest at District Show
- Counties can enter 2 junior teams & 2 senior teams
- Juniors will compete in an abbreviated version of the hippology contest and will not present a team problem.

HIPPOLOGY CONTEST (PG. 69-70); TEAMS MUST CONSIST OF 3 OR 4 MEMBERS

HORSE ART & PHOTOGRAPHY (PG. 70-72)

- Districts may submit only the TOP 5 winning junior
 and senior entries in each category from that district
- If you qualify for the state show, turn in entry
 - 10:00 A.M. until 12:00 Noon, Wednesday, June 19th,
 East End of Kirk Fordice Equine Center

HORSE PHOTOGRAPHY (PG. 71)

- General Rules
 - 2. All digital and 35mm entries will be judged together in each category.
- Photography Categories
 - Breed Promotion, Action, Non-action, and Human
 Interest

HORSE PHOTOGRAPHY (PG. 71)

- Rules for Horse Photography Contest
 - -4. Photographs MUST have a horse/equid as the primary focus of the picture!

HORSE T-SHIRT CONTEST (PG. 72)

1. Each 4-H county is allowed to submit one
printed t-shirt that promotes the 4-H horse
program to its District 4-H Horse Show. If a
county has multiple horse clubs, that county
will have to decide the one t-shirt to submit to
represent that county.

SWAZYE WOODRUFF MEMORIAL ALL-AROUND AWARD (PG. 73)

- Exhibitor must compete in one non-riding contest at the State 4-H Horse Show, including Horse Judging, Horse Public Speaking, Individual Demonstration, Team Demonstration, Horse Bowl, and Hippology.
- Exhibitor must compete in at least three events in three or more categories on the same horse.
