Some of you may remember me from camp: I stepped into a fire ant mound during the July camp (2004), and trapped deer flies on blue buckets in Mathiston last year. John, Mike and I have done youth education projects since I joined MS State in 2003. Dr. John and Dr. Mike are pros at youth education and 4-H entomology. I am fortunate to have them as mentors.

Why am I interested in youth education in entomology? I see entomology as a great opportunity to share what I love to do with children. Dr. John and I recently discussed the 'nature deficit' among children. A nice review of this research can be found at (http://www.oriononline.org/pages/om/05-4om/Louv.html). The theme is that children with a connection to nature are less susceptible to problems such as ADHD. The rise in ADHD seems to coincide with the cultivation of cul-de-sacs and not crops on family farmlands. Most children, even in agricultural states such as Mississippi, have only marginal contact with nature. This is where Entomology and youth education are useful. Dr. John says, "Insects are our most frequent encounter with wildlife". Entomology impacts every aspect of life and it is a great tool for introducing children to nature. I look forward to working with everyone at camp this year.

**Book Review:** To Know a Fly by Vincent Dethier (recommended reading for science fair competitors!)

Vincent G. Dethier's To Know a Fly is a classic in entomological circles and should be with science fair competitors. Dethier was obviously an outstanding researcher, teacher and writer. In this easy read he proposes the fly as an excellent subject for study and proceeds to describe a series of experiments to discover how a fly works. He also shows the humorous side of scientists and their work that so often is confined to the lab. Science is fun and Dethier provides amble examples from his lab and research.
