You Don't Know Jacks!

A guide to Gulf of Mexico Seriola jacks

You don't know jacks—or do you? Below are some useful hints to help you correctly identify your fish.

- *Is it larger than 3 feet?* If so, it's a greater amberjack.
- Is it deep-bodied with a tall dorsal fin? If so, it's an almaco jack.

If not, the number of spines and position of the eyes will help you determine the species.

Banded Rudderfish	8		 bony keel by tail white-tipped tail flat-edged mouth max. fork length: 2'3"
Lesser Amberjack	8		 blunt mouth stripe not to first dorsal fin proportionally larger eye max. fork length: 2'2"
Greater Amberjack	7		 slender body stripe to first dorsal fin corner of mouth upturned max. fork length: 3'7"
Almaco Jack	7		deep bodytall dorsal and anal finsmax. fork length: 2'7"

Dashed lines in the first column indicate position of anal fin relative to second dorsal fin.
